NFHS Coaches Code Of Ethics

The function of a coach is to educate students through participation in interscholastic competition. An interscholastic program should be designed to enhance academic achievement and should never interfere with opportunities for academic success. Each student should be treated with the utmost respect, and his or her welfare should be considered in decisions by the coach at all times. Accordingly, the following guidelines for coaches have been adopted by the NFHS Board of Directors.

- The coach shall be aware that he or she has a tremendous influence, for either good or ill, on the education of the student and, thus, shall never place the value of winning above the value of instilling the highest ideals of character.
- The coach shall uphold the honor and dignity of the profession. In all personal contact with students, officials, athletic directors, school administrators, the state high school athletic association, the media, and the public, the coach shall strive to set an example of the highest ethical and moral conduct.
- The coach shall take an active role in the prevention of drug, alcohol and tobacco abuse.
- The coach shall avoid the use of alcohol and tobacco products when in contact with players.
- The coach shall promote the entire interscholastic program of the school and direct his or her program in harmony with the total school program.
- The coach shall master the contest rules and shall teach them to his or her team members. The coach shall not seek an advantage by circumvention of the spirit or letter of the rules.
- The coach shall exert his or her influence to enhance sportsmanship by spectators, both directly and by working closely with cheerleaders, pep club sponsors, booster clubs, and administrators.
- The coach shall respect and support contest officials. The coach shall not indulge in conduct which
 would incite players or spectators against the officials. Public criticism of officials or players is unethical.
- The coach should meet and exchange cordial greetings with the opposing coach to set the correct tone for the event before and after the contest.
- The coach shall not exert pressure on faculty members to give student special consideration.
- The coach shall not scout opponents by any means other than those adopted by the league and/or state high school athletic association.

WIND CHILL PROCEDURES

Administration of Wind Chill Procedures:

- Wind Chill will be checked 1 hour before the contest/practice by a certified athletic trainer, athletic director, or school designee when the air temperature is 39 degrees (Fahrenheit) or lower.
- The athletic trainer, athletic director, or school designee will use the accuweather.com
 website to determine the heat index for the area of the contest/practice. The
 accuweather.com website can be reached through the NYSPHSAA website. Once a
 person is on the accuweather.com website, they will put in the zip code for the location
 of the contest/practice and the website will give them the air temperature as well as the
 RealFeel temperature (wind chill).
- If the RealFeel temperature (wind chill) is 10 degrees or below, the athletic trainer, athletic director, or school designee must re-check the RealFeel (wind chill) at halftime or midway point of the contest. If the RealFeel (wind chill) temperature is -11 degrees (Fahrenheit) or lower, the contest will be suspended.

Please refer to the following chart to take the appropriate actions:

NYSPHSAA THUNDER & LIGHTNING POLICY

(Effective 10/25/04) (Revised October 20, 2008)

Applies to regular season through NYSPHSAA Finals:

- 1) Thunder and lightning necessitates that contests be suspended. The occurrence of thunder and/or lightning is not subject to interpretation or discussion thunder is thunder, lightning is lightning.
 - a) With your site administrator, set up a plan for shelter prior to the start of any contest.
- 2) When thunder is heard and/or when lightning is seen, the following procedures should be adhered to:
 - a) Suspend play and direct participants to go to shelter, a building normally occupied by the public or if a building is unavailable, participants should go inside a vehicle with a solid metal top (e.g. bus, van, car).
 - b) Do not permit people to stand under or near a tree; and have all stay away from poles, antennas, towers and underground watering systems.
 - c) After thunder and/or lightning have left the area, wait 30 minutes after the last boom is heard or strike is seen before resuming play or competition.

EMERGENCY ACTION PLAN: Required by NYSPHSAA and Section 8 for injuries or unforeseen emergencies. All FH coaches are to check with their AD and familiarize themselves with the plan/s. Plans will be in place for Final games.

Student and Parent Information Sheet

CONCUSSION DEFINITION

A concussion is a reaction by the brain to a jolt or force that can be transmitted to the head by an impact or blow occurring anywhere on the body. Essentially a concussion results from the brain moving back and forth or twisting rapidly inside the skull.

FACTS ABOUT CONCUSSIONS ACCORDING TO THE CENTER FOR DISEASE CONTROL (CDC)

- An estimated 4 million people under age 19 sustain a head injury annually. Of these approximately 52,000 die and 275,000 are hospitalized.
- An estimated 300,000 sports and recreation related concussions occur each year.
- Students who have had at least one concussion are at increased risk for another concussion.

In New York State in 2009, approximately 50,500 children under the age of 19 visited the emergency room for a traumatic brain injury and of those approximately 3,000 were hospitalized.

REQUIREMENTS OF SCHOOL DISTRICTS

Education

- Each school coach, physical education teacher, nurse, and athletic trainer will have to complete an approved course on concussion management on a biennial basis, starting with the 2012-2013 school year.
 - * School coaches and physical education teachers must complete the CDC course.
 - (www.cdc.gov/concussion/HeadsUp/online_training.html)
 - School nurses and certified athletic trainers must complete the concussion course. (http://preventingconcussions.org)

Information:

- Provide concussion management information and sign off with any parental permission form.
- The concussion management and awareness information or the State Education Department's web site must be made available on the school web site, if one exists.

Removal from athletics:

- Require the immediate removal from athletic activities of any pupil that has or is believed to have sustained a mild traumatic brain injury.
- No pupils will be allowed to resume athletic activity until
 they have been symptom free for 24 hours and have been
 evaluated by and received written and signed authorization
 from a licensed physician. For interscholastic athletics,
 clearance must come from the school medical director.
 - * Such authorization must be kept in the pupil's permanent heath record.
 - * Schools shall follow directives issued by the pupil's treating physician.

SYMPTOMS

Symptoms of a concussion are the result of a temporary change in the brain's function. In most cases, the symptoms of a concussion generally resolve over a short period of time; however, in some cases, symptoms will last for weeks or longer. Children and adolescents are more susceptible to concussions and take longer than adults to recover.

It is imperative that any student who is suspected of having a concussion is removed from athletic activity (e.g. recess, PE class, sports) and remains out of such activities until evaluated and cleared to return to activity by a physician.

Symptoms include, but are not limited to:

- Decreased or absent memory of events prior to or immediately after the injury, or difficulty retaining new information
- Confusion or appears dazed
- Headache or head pressure
- Loss of consciousness
- Balance difficulties, dizziness, or clumsy movements
- Double or blurry vision
- Sensitivity to light and/or sound
- Nausea, vomiting and/or loss of appetite
- Irritability, sadness or other changes in personality
 Feeling sluggish, foggy or light-headed
- Concentration or focusing problems
- Drowsiness
- Fatigue and/or sleep issues sleeping more or less than usual

Students who develop any of the following signs, or if signs and symptoms worsen, should be seen and evaluated immediately at the nearest hospital emergency room.

- · Headaches that worsen
- Seizures
- Looks drowsy and/or cannot be awakened
- Repeated vomiting
- Slurred speech
- Unable to recognize people or places
- Weakness or numbing in arms or legs, facial drooping
- Unsteady gait
- Change in pupil size in one eye
- Significant irritability
- Any loss of consciousness
- Suspicion for skull fracture: blood draining from ear or clear fluid from the nose



SPORTSMANSHIP

The Association recognizes and appreciates that the influence and responsibility of the school administration with regard to good sportsmanship extends to all levels of competition. However, it must also be seen that the NYSPHSAA has been vested with the responsibility to ensure that all contests under its jurisdiction are conducted satisfactorily. This standard applies to all regular season and post schedule play.

a. Coach:

1. Any coach excluded by a certified official from an interschool competition for unsportsmanlike conduct, including taunting, is ineligible to coach any interschool competition in that sport until after the next previously scheduled contest at the same level (e.g. junior varsity, varsity, etc.) has been completed. In individual sports a multi-day contest is considered to be a contest. Disqualification from one season carries over to the next season of participation. The coach may not be present at the game site nor communicate in any manner during the contest with any person present at the site.

NOTE: "Not being physically present at the site" means the disqualified coach is not to be present in the locker room, on the sidelines, in the stands or site area before, during or after the game/meet. (see Taunting, p. 90, Next Previously Scheduled Contest, p. 89) Any coach that does not serve the penalty for violating the Sportsmanship Standard will be ineligible to participant in the next two regularly scheduled contests. If the coach continues to not serve the penalty, the matter will be referred to the Section for further action. If the coach is involved in the NYSPHSAA play-offs, the matter will be referred to the Executive Director of the NYSPHSAA.

Any coach:

- 1. Who receives a disqualification penalty in a sport shall not participate in the next regularly scheduled contest;
- 2. Who receives a second disqualification penalty in the same sport in the same season shall not participate in the next two regularly scheduled contests; and
- 3. Who receives a third disqualification penalty in the same sport in the same season will not be allowed to participate for the rest of the season. If the disqualification penalty takes place in the last contest of the season (regular season or post schedule play), the Section Athletic Council will assess the penalty carrying over into the next season of participation.
- 2. A coach who strikes, shoves, kicks or makes other physical contact with the intent to annoy, harass or intimidate another person (e.g. official, another coach, player, fan) shall be expelled immediately and banned from further participation or coaching in all sports for a period of time to be determined by the section not to exceed one year from the date of the offense.

b. Player:

1. Any member of a squad disqualified by a sport official for unsportsmanlike conduct, including taunting, or for a flagrant foul shall not participate in that sport in the next previously scheduled contest with a member school or in NYSPHSAA tournament play. In individual sports a multi-day contest is considered to be a contest. The contest in which the athlete was disqualified must count in the total maximum number of contests permitted. Disqualifications from one season carry over to the next season of participation. (see Taunting, p. 90, Next Previously Scheduled Contest, p. 89)

Any player:

- 1. Who receives a disqualification penalty in a sport shall not participate in the next regularly scheduled contest:
- 2. Who receives a second disqualification penalty in the same sport in the same season shall not participate in the next two regularly scheduled contests; and
- 3. Who receives a third disqualification penalty in the same sport in the same season will not be allowed to participate for the rest of the season. If the third ejection takes place in the last contest of the season (regular season or post schedule play), the Section Athletic Council will assess the penalty carrying over into the next season of participation.
- 2. Any member of the squad who strikes, shoves, kicks or makes other physical contact with the intent to annoy, harass or intimidate an official shall be expelled from the game immediately and banned from further participation in all sports for a period of time to be determined by the section not to exceed one year from the date of the offense. **NOTE:** Member of the squad includes player, manager, score keepers, timers, and statisticians.
- 1. Unprofessional conduct on the part of the official such as, but not limited to, taunting, baiting, use of profanity, shall be reported by a school administrator from the aggrieved school to the section executive director. A request will be made to the appropriate sport officials chapter to investigate the incidence and to report their action to the section in a timely manner.

Yellow card:

- *Corner:* a player who has sat out for the 5 minute penalty may enter on corner a long as she does not delay play. She is not considered a substitute and can reenter the field anytime.
- *Overtime:* If a yellow card penalty extends into overtime, the carded players name may be one of the 7 in the book and the team plays short. Once her penalty is served, she came go on to the field. If the yellow carded player is not involved in the overtime, the coach determines which player will sit out for the penalty and the team plays short until the penalty is completed *Ref NYSPHSAA FIELD HOCKEY MEETING Nov 21 2009*

HAND SHAKE: for minimal contact, it is suggested that instead of a handshake at the beginning and end of a game, players line up and GENTLY tap stick heads at ground level, maintaining social distance.

SCRIMMAGE DEFINITION NYSPHSAA as of January 2010

THESE GUIDELINES MUST BE USED FOR ALL NYSPHSAA FIELD HOCKEY SCRIMMAGES

The following is definition of a Field Hockey scrimmage has been approved and will appear in the 2010-2012 NYSPHSAA Handbook.

FIELD HOCKEY: A field hockey scrimmage must start with a sideline or 16 yard hit and includes **one or more** of the following:

- 1. A running clock and/or modified periods
- 2. Incorporate all or part of the Overtime Procedure into the scrimmage
- 3. Each team will take 5 offensive corners, playing until either a goal is scored; ball goes out of bounds or crosses the 25yd line.

5 GOAL DIFFERENTIAL RULE:

NYSPHAA FH policy: When a team is beating another team by 5 or more goals, **THE CLOCK WILL RUN AFTER GOALS**.

NOISEMAKERS: as per NYSPHSAA, noisemakers are not permitted at during any game or contest.

PRACTICE DAYS: 6 days of PRACTICES PRIOR TO GAME OR SCRIMMAGE

TEAMS MAY NOT PRACTICE OR PLAY 7 DAYS IN A ROW—during regular season SECTION 8 MAXIMUM NUMBER OF GAMES: 16

AFTER SCORING A GOAL: it is suggested that the player who scored is to carry or *DRIBBLE* the ball back to the 50 yd. line.

SECTION 8 FIELD HOCKEY OVERTIME----FOR REGULAR SEASON PLAY

(SAME AS 2022)

FOLLOW ALL OF THE NYS FH OT Pg. 17, 18 & 19---EXCEPT: OMIT III (no second 10 min 7v7)

- **☞ ONLY USE 1 TEN MINUTE 7V7 OVERTIME PERIOD**
- **☞ IF A TIE STILL REMAINS after 1 ten minute 7v7: GO DIRECTLY TO 1V1 SHOOTOUT**

ALL OTHER NYSPHSAA FH OT RULES ARE IN EFFECT

SECTION VIII SCORE DIFFERENTIAL POLICY: When a field hockey score reaches a differential of 6, the coach and players of the team with the higher score will attempt to reduce the possibility if scoring additional goals. If the score becomes a differential of 7, the team should know it is time to work with the ball instead of shooting at the goal. Coaches must have a signal or plan ready to implement since there are no timeouts except for halftime. Game final score with a differential of 8 or more are to be reported to the coordinator and the Exec. Dir. (Each differential is sport specific)

TIMERS: When the official timer is in the booth, *ANOTHER PERSON HAS TO TIME THE PENALTIES FROM THE TABLE*. If the school does not have another person, TIME must be kept at the table.

HOME team is to provide the official timer and scorekeeper at the table.

If there is enough room at the table for social distancing, the visiting team may have a scorekeeper at the table.

EMERGENCY ACTION PLAN: Required by NYSPHSAA and Section 8 for injuries or unforeseen emergencies. All FH coaches are to check with their AD and familiarize themselves with the plan/s. Plans will be in place for Final games.

Field Hockey Rules Changes – 2023 By NFHS on February 21, 2023 field hockey

1-5-5 REMOVED: The change allows players to wear jewelry to aid officials in consistent enforcement.

Rationale: Allows wearing of jewelry keeping with current trends in other rules codes for consistency of officiating and coaching.

1-8-1a: Defines the size requirements for goalkeeper uniform numbers.

Rationale: Brings the goalkeeper's uniform requirements for a number in line with the player's uniform number

1-8-1h: Updates terminology regarding goalkeeper shoes.

Rationale: Equipment has evolved and goalkeepers wear kickers over their shoes. Kickers should cover the shoes completely. Spikes and metal cleats are illegal.

4-1-3: Permits the playing captain to call a time-out.

Rationale: When a time-out was added to the rules, the playing captain was omitted. If no playing captain is on the field of play, then only the coach may call a time-out.

8-1-1w (NEW): Provides consistency when officiating loose equipment in the field of play.

8-2-1k (NEW): Clarifies that a misconduct penalty should be issued when equipment is thrown in a dangerous or unsportsmanlike manner.

Rationale: The rule change defines loose equipment in the field of play as a foul and clarifies that throwing of equipment is a misconduct penalty. The rules clarify for officials on how to handle the penalty in the field of play or the circle.

8-2-1 PENALTIES (NEW): Defines the penalty application regarding player re-entry during suspension time.

Rationale: Clarifies the application of existing rules and offers guidance to officials on how to handle players entering before serving the full suspension time.

Field Hockey Overtime Procedures 2023 (SAME AS 2022) TEAMS ARE ALLOWED ONE TIMEOUT as per NYSPHSAA

SECTION 8 REGULAR SEASSON OT DOES NOT USE III BELOW if a tie exists after II, go directly to IV

- I. At the end of the regulation game, there will be a coaching intermission that will last up to 5 minutes. **The Officials will:**
- Meet with Captains and Coach.
- Toss of coin: the Visiting team calls the toss. The winner of the toss gets choice of possession OR end of field.
- The tableside official remains the head official for all segments of the overtime procedures.

II. Ten minute OT 7 V 7 sudden victory OT period:

- Rolling substitutions are permitted.
- Each team is permitted one time out during the 10-minute overtime period
- Defensive corners during 7 v 7:
- Defense will be reduced to 4 players (3 plus goalie) behind end line
- The remaining defensive player goes behind the 50 yd line with the rest of the team.
- The attack remains the same.

III. ONLY USE III IN PLAYOFFS If a tie still exists after the first 10 minute overtime, the teams will play a second 10 minute

7 V 7 Sudden Victory overtime period.

- A coaching intermission, lasting 5 minutes, will be allowed prior to the start of the second OT period.
- Teams will change ends of the field, the team not having possession at the start of the first OT shall have possession to start the second OT.
- each team is allowed one time out.
- Rolling substitution are permitted.
- Defensive corners same as above.
- The attack remains the same.

IV. If the score remains tied at the end of the second 10 minute overtime period; a Shoot-out will take place.

A set of 5 alternating shoot outs take place in each series. A full set of 5 is played.

- Players from each team take a 1v1 shoot-out, alternately against the goalkeeper of the other team.
- Five (5) players per team will take the shoot-out in the sequence nominated and communicated by the team to the umpires on duty before the start of the shoot-out competition. The order of shoot-out must be indicated to the umpires at the coin toss.
- The umpires, in conjunction with the tournament committee will choose the goal to be used.
- Toss of coin: The **Visiting team** calls the toss. The team which wins the toss has the choice to take or defend the first shoot-out.

1. The team scoring or awarded the most goals is the winner and the competition ceases once an outright winner is determined. Winner is declared: when there is a clear winner and play is not necessary to finish the group of 5. ex: during the 1st group of five 1v1 scenarios, the score is 4-1, there is no need to play out the last two players.

PLAYERS AND COACHES—

- o When not involved in play, the Goalkeeper may stand on the end line on the side of the goal closest to her team OR may stand behind the 25 yd line with the 5 players involved in the shootout.
- Team members, and coaches not involved in the shootout, may stand on the field, behind the 30 yd. line, 5-10 yards from the sideline. One team on each side of the field.
- o PLAYERS should be ready for the next shootout, but not raced into the set up.
- o If the goalie is a shooter, she is considered a field player.
- A player who has been excluded permanently (red card) from the field of play during that same match, cannot take part in any shoot-out competition.
- A team with a player who was carded during the shootout, must play short in the shootout period.

V. Shootout:

OFFICIALS:

- o Lead and Trail officials will call the shootout.
- o Lead official during regulation time will continue to be lead regardless of which goal is chosen.
- o Table official will keep time.
- o If Sectional games have a Certified *Table official*, the *Table official* will keep the time. If a Certified Official is not assigned to the table during Sectional games, the timer will turn her/his back to the field and start the 10 seconds with the official's whistle. The official time will be kept on the field.
- Officials should not feel they have to move the 1v1 along. Officials should scan both benches, allowing players and coaches a reasonable amount of time to set up for each shootout.

PROCEDURE:

- The goalkeeper starts on or behind the goal line between the posts.
- The ball is placed on the nearest 25 yd line opposite the center of the goal.
- The attacker stands outside the 25 yd line near the ball.
- The umpire blows the whistle to signal the start of the shootout; the attacker and the goalkeeper may then move in any direction.
- The shoot-out is completed under the following conditions:
 - o 10 seconds has elapsed.
 - o The attacker scores a goal.
 - o The attacker commits a foul.
 - o The goalkeeper commits an unintentional foul in which case the shoot-out is re-taken.
 - o The goalkeeper commits an intentional foul, in which case a penalty stroke is awarded.
 - O The ball goes out of play over the back-line or side-line; this includes the goalkeeper intentionally playing the ball over the back-line (not a foul). The ball simply going outside the circle a second time does not constitute the end of a shoot-out.

Replacement situations

- If a penalty stroke is awarded as specified above, it is taken by the two players involved in the shoot-out concerned, unless either of them is incapacitated or suspended. This penalty stroke will take place before the next available shoot-out takes place.
- If the replacement goalkeeper is a field player, that player is allowed reasonable time to put on protective equipment.
- If during a shoot-out competition, a defending goalkeeper is incapacitated, that goalkeeper may be replaced by

- another goalkeeper.
- If during the shoot-out competition, an attacker is incapacitated, that attacker may be replaced by another player from the team unless suspended by the umpire prior to or during the shoot-out competition.

VI. If a tie still exists after the first series of 5 shoot-out, a second series of 5 shoot-outs will take place.

- Coaches may change the order and/or players before the start of the second shootout.
- A coaching intermission lasting 2 minutes, will be allowed prior to the start of the second shoot-out period.
- The coach must inform the umpires as to the order in which the nominated players take the shoot-out.
- The team who had taken the first shoot-out of the first series must defend the second series.

**If a tie still exists after a second series of 5 shootouts, Sudden Victory of 5 additional shoot-outs are taken. (Follow the same process criteria as above.)

VII. Misconduct:

- 1. Each team will begin the first 7v7 overtime with seven players, one of which must be a Goalkeeper, (unless players were disqualified or have not completed a suspension during any previous playing period. Teams will play short during this time.)
- 2. Any player who has been disqualified (Red Carded) during regulation play is not eligible for the overtime period and the team will plays short for the entire overtime.
- 3. A player suspended (Green/Yellow Carded) during regulation play, would be eligible at the completion of the suspension timeframe of the 7v7 periods. The team plays short until the suspension is completed.
- 4. At the beginning of the first round of 1v1shootout, a suspended player with time that is carried over into the 1v1 shootout round will be unable to participate in any future shootout rounds. **Teams will start the 1 v1 shootout with 5 players**.
- 5. If an Attack player is Green / Yellow carded **during** the shootout, that player may be replaced with an eligible shooter to participate in any future shoot outs. However the player carded will be unable to participate in any future shootout rounds. Any further player who is carded during the shootout will follow the same procedure.
- 6. If an Attack player is Red carded **during** the shootout, their team will only have 4 shooters participate in any future shootouts. The player carded will be unable to participate in any future shootout rounds. Any future shoot-out the player was entitled to take counts as no goal. The spot of the no goal in future shootouts will be determined by the carded player's coach.
- 7. If a goalie is carded **during** the shootout, she is replaced and is unable to participate in any future rounds. The replacement goalkeeper is allowed reasonable time to put on protective equipment. If the goalie is Red carded, she will be replaced and is unable to participate in any future rounds. An Attack player will be removed from the shootout series and her spot in future shootouts will count as a no goal. The spot of the no goal in future shootouts will be determined by the carded player's coach.
- 8. It is expected that the players and coaches will not enter the field of play until the official has signaled the end of the game or overtime. Failure to comply will be treated as misconduct.

This is to acknowledge that a protest has been made.**

SCHEDULES: are posted on the BOCES website with officials assigned

It is suggested that players be instructed to stand/sit at the back line of the team area so the coaches will have space to move within the team area.


Player and team equipment bags should be behind the back line of the team area.



Class B: 6 teams are eligible for playoffs,

(Clarke, Friends Academy, Garden City, Great Neck North, Great Neck South, Manhasset, North Shore, Locust Valley, Seaford)

Class C: 4 teams are eligible for playoffs (all 4 C teams are in playoffs)

(Carle Place, Cold Spring Harbor, Friends Academy, Oyster Bay)

GAME CLOCK: Coaches, please educate your spectators to avoid confusion

GAME RULES: All regular game rules will apply

REMINDER: all shin guards must be as close to knee high as possible and all team members MUST have the same color (appropriate to team uniform)

UNIFORMS: if it is cold, make sure that your team is legal.

If your players are wearing long sleeves under their game shirts, only the home team can wear white long sleeves the away team must wear black or dark colored sleeves, the team members must all be in the same color.

GOALIE HELMETS:

MUST be Field Hockey approved: double check to make sure it is not a lacrosse helmet.

INTERRUPTED GAMES:

Once a game has started, the officials are in charge of the game. They will make every attempt to see that the game continues. If the game has to be stopped, due to weather, the game will be continued from the point of interruption. Playoff games are not complete after the first half. Every attempt will be made to use the same site and the same officials.

NOISEMAKERS:

As per NYSPHSAA rules, the use of noisemakers is prohibited.

All schools are to inform their spectators.

SCHOOL SUPERVISORS are required.

PROTESTS: A protest must be filed immediately, as per Section 8 rules. (A protest cannot be filed once the game is over).

If it is not possible to resolve the protest at that time, the game will continue after the protest has be documented by both coaches and both officials. (Signing a protest statement by the opposing coach or officials does not mean that those people agree with the protest) At the end of the game, the protesting team must declare their intention to continue or drop the protest. The Section Coordinator must be notified immediately following the game.

FINAL GAMES: A protest will be resolved immediately by the onsite protest committee.

PHOTOGRAPHERS MUST stand 5 yards behind the team areas, 5 yards back from the opposite side line. (as per the rules of the game)

No one is allowed behind the goal cage or end lines (rules of the game) Please inform your school photographers.

PROTEST COMMITTEES FINAL GAMES: Will be on site. Protest will be resolved before play continues.

RESTROOMS: Restrooms will be open in the building behind the Concession Stand.

SCOREBOOK: Each team provides a scorekeeper. The home team scorekeeer will sit at the official table.

SPECTATORS: Spectators must be in the bleachers on the opposite side from the team benches.

SUPERVISORS: All teams MUST provide at least 2 supervisors

SUPERVISORS must be visible and prepared to control spectators as necessary SEE RESPONSIBILITY SHEET pg. 33

TEAM AREAS: (looking at the field from the table) HOME team has the bench to the right of the table. Visiting team has the bench to the left of the table. Only coaches, players, manager, score keepers and trainers will be allowed in the team area. NO EXTRA PERSONNEL WILL BE ALLOWED ON THE FIELD.

Athletic Directors who would like to be on the field must be behind the designated team area which is: 5 yards from the sideline, between the 45 and 25 yd lines.

No one may stand below the 25 yd line.

TRAINER: TEAMS do their own taping. A trainer will be on site for injuries.

TRACK: Except for teams, NO ONE IS ALLOWED ON THE TRACK AT BERNER

VIDEOTAPING: Only from the bleachers or outside the fenced area. There is NO access to the press box or it's roof.

Videotaping is allowed from anywhere in the bleachers as long as it does not block the view of paying spectators. Top rows are suggested.

WATER AND ICE: Teams are to bring their own water, cups and ice to the field for all playoff games, including Finals and Regionals..

FIELD HOCKEY 2023 SUPERVISOR RESPONSIBILITIES FOR ALL PLAYOFF GAMES

All schools are required to supply at least 2 supervisors to all post season games.

Supervisors are to be visible, IN THE BLEACHERS with their school's spectators, and wearing distinguishing attire.

Supervisors are to make sure all spectators are in the bleachers.

No one is allowed on the field or track except team personnel

Supervisors are required to make sure that the spectators are using appropriate encouragement of their team and not making derogatory comments.

The Supervisors will remove any spectator from the field/stadium if such a request is made from the officials

If a game goes to Overtime 1 vs. goalie: All Spectators MUST: be kept away from the field AND stand on the sideline between the 25 & 50 yd. lines

(Keep them away from the goal end of the field)

Enforce the NYSPHSAA rule: NO NOISEMAKERS

NO TAILGATING: Supervisors must stay with the group and make sure that they leave in a timely fashion.

High School Field Hockey Eyewear Rule Altered for 2020 Season

INDIANAPOLIS, IN (July 27, 2023) — In response to longstanding concerns regarding the wearing of goggles in high school field hockey, the NFHS Board of Directors approved a change in the eyewear rule that will take effect with the upcoming 2020 season.

Rule 1-6-5 in the NFHS Field Hockey Rules Book, which currently states that "All field players shall wear eye protection that met the ASTM standard for field hockey (2713) at the time of manufacture," will now state that "Goggles may be worn by all field hockey players."

In addition to the current rule, an additional note was due to take effect in 2020 as follows: "Beginning in the 2020 fall season, all eye protection shall be permanently labeled with the ASTM 2713 standard for field hockey at the time of manufacture."

Since goggles were mandated by the NFHS Board of Directors in 2011 with the intent to lessen the risk of catastrophic eye injuries, there have been a number of concerns that led to the current rule modification.

While there is a required ASTM standard for field hockey goggles, there is no NOCSAE standard, which is preferred as NOCSAE's aim is to protect against worst case

injury. The ASTM 2713 standard is not protective against a direct ball to the eye in testing. NOCSAE will not certify any facial/eye protection unless it is integrated into a helmet.

One of the ongoing concerns has been that ASTM-certified goggles are not available for all field players, notably those who wear corrective lenses. Since the current rule cannot be met by individuals with glasses, state associations have been issuing waivers for students with corrective lenses to allow participation.

Also, in addition to lack of available product to meet the rule, no significant research data has indicated that goggles have reduced the number of eye injuries, particularly those of a catastrophic nature.

Finally, while the mandatory eyewear rule was put into effect as a guard against eye injury, the wearing of goggles has created a higher risk concern regarding the penalty corner. Under the current eyewear rule, players cannot remove their goggles to wear full facemasks on penalty corners, which is the most dangerous play in the sport. Now, players can elect to wear corner masks.

The NFHS Sports Medicine Advisory Committee, which was in support of the action by the Board of Directors, noted that the ASTM standard that has been required does not eliminate the risk of injury for which the rule was established (loss of an eye).

"Given the fact that the previous rule that required goggles did not completely lessen the risk of catastrophic eye injuries, and that the product does not exist for players with corrective lenses, and that there is no NOCSAE standard for field hockey goggles, and that the wearing of goggles prevents players from wearing corner masks on penalty corners, the Board believed it was time to make the rule permissive in nature rather than mandatory," said Julie Cochran, director of sports and liaison to the Field Hockey Rules Committee.

Although the rule has been changed to state that goggles **may** be worn, state associations, schools and parents can still elect to require the use of goggles.

WELCOME TO THE 2023 PRESEASON GUIDE FOR HIGH SCHOOL COACHES AND OFFICIALS

As we look forward to the fall field hockey season, the NFHS wants to thank the high school coaches, administrators and officials who dedicate their time and professionalism to the students involved in the sport of field hockey. The purpose of this preseason guide is to highlight the rules changes for the year and to offer tools and tips for coaches and officials.

The NFHS and USA Field Hockey have partnered to help support, sustain and grow high school field hockey across the nation. The community surrounding the sport is positive, supportive, and enthusiastic and we hope to build on that support to continue to grow the sport at the high school level.









01 POINTS OF EMPHASIS

Card Progression

Card progression is an important tool for officials in game management as a method of de-escalation, fairness and reducing risk of injury during the game. A verbal caution to both teams may serve to ward off a potentially volatile situation. However, when one player or team commits repetitive fouls, it is not appropriate game management to include both teams in the card progression. Both teams have their own card progression.

Proper Field Markings and Grass Length

It is imperative that fields are properly marked, including all side markings for team area, team line, substitution area and spectator line. These ensure the safety of players, coaches, spectators and officials. The tableside official must have a clear line of sight. If there is no line 5 yards from the sideline designating the team area, or if this line is ignored, coaches or players who are within 5 yards of the sideline

are blocking that official's view and creating a potentially dangerous situation to the officials, coaches or players.

Additionally, for grass fields, to minimize risk for all participants and ensure a more consistent and uniform playing surface, the grass should be cut to a maximum height of 11/2 inches.

Play Inside the Circle – Corner vs. Stroke

It is vital that officials recognize that breakdown fouls by

the defense in the circle that interfere with the opponent's possession of the ball or their opportunity to score require more than the awarding of a penalty corner. If the official deems the foul to be deliberate, the foul must be penalized by awarding a penalty stroke to the opponent [Rule 11-1-1b]. Additionally, for an egregious foul, a misconduct penalty may be awarded using the card progression.

Delay of Game

Managing the flow of the game without hurrying a team is a necessary skill for all officials. For repetitive, non-dangerous fouls, the appropriate card should be issued. Some examples of delay include but are not limited to: hitting the ball away after the whistle; not moving 5 yards away in order to slow the restart of play; or prolonged huddling by a team prior to a penalty corner.

Officials are encouraged to practice preventive officiating

to help limit delays in the game and maintain the spirit, flow and safety of the game. Coaches and players should also understand the importance of their role in maintaining the flow of the game.

BUILDING A RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN COACHES AND UMPIRES

As the sport of field hockey continues to grow, so does the need for critical roles that can help foster this growth of the sport we all love. The two roles that are needed to make the field hockey world go round are coaches and umpires. Coaches are the leaders of the team, teaching not only their wealth of field hockey knowledge to their players, but also teaching important life skills that athletes can take with them into their futures. It's important to understand that both sides need to have

a critical line of communication and respect given to both parties. If we want field hockey to grow, we need the recruitment and retainment of umpires to grow. We cannot allow them to be berated by players and spectators, and especially coaches. Coaches are the ones person on the field that everyone looks to as a role model. The coach's attitude can determine the attitude of their players and what they allow or disallow can set the tone of the teams and spectators.

It's also important for umpires to give respect to coaches. Coaches may understand the game in ways that differ from umpires. We need to learn from these experiences and understand that it all comes down to communicating. It's impossible to build a relationship without communication. To foster the relationship between coaches and umpires, there first needs to be a level of respect. We are not enemies; we need to remember that

both parties love field hockey at the end of the day.

There are different approaches for each umpire, but most of the time, umpires need to be the calm, cool and collected party. While they should hear out the coach and diffuse situations, that does not mean umpires should take the brunt of the yelling and frustrations of the coach. A coach

should be able to, at the proper time, talk with the umpires and let them know what they are seeing and feeling. Umpires should listen so the coach feels heard, and then the umpire can process and decide how to work through this going forward in the game. TACKLING - THE GOOD, BAD AND UGLY

There is no wrong side to tackle from. There is no wrong side to tackle from. There is no wrong side to tackle from.

While we process that statement and leave Bart Simpson to write it out another 97 times for further emphasis, let's add some context and color to the idea.

The rules of field hockey include the following provisions:

- Players are expected to act responsibly at all times;
- Players on the field must hold their stick and not use it in
- a dangerous way;
- Players must not lift their stick over the heads of other

players;

• Players must not touch, handle or interfere with other

players or their sticks or clothing;

- Players must not intimidate or impede another player;
- Players must not play the ball with the back of the stick; Players may play the ball in a controlled manner in any part of the field when the ball is at any height including

above the shoulder unless this is dangerous or leads to

danger;

• Players must not play the ball dangerously or in a way

which leads to dangerous play;

• Players obstruct if they physically interfere with the stick

or body of an opponent;

• Players must not tackle unless in a position to play the

ball without body contact;

• Reckless play, such as sliding tackles and other overly

physical challenges by field players, which take an opponent to ground and which have the potential to cause injury, should attract appropriate match and personal penalties;

• Goalkeepers are not permitted to conduct themselves in a manner which is dangerous to other players by taking advantage of the protective equipment they wear.

It's worth highlighting just how much there is to process and how many boxes must be clicked or crossed in the minds

of umpires with every tackle situation that a game presents. Hundreds of events in every match, each needing to be observed, considered and ruled on with split-second timing.

But there is nothing saying that you can't tackle from the left. Nada about the right being off limits. Not a peep about tackling from behind. So where is this fable there that one supposedly can't tackle from? It simply doesn't exist.

The good

It's not about where a tackle is made from, it's all about how it is made. Hours, seasons and years are spent coaching tackling techniques and best practices. Front-on tackling, jab tackles from the side, shave tackles from behind – options exist to tackle an opponent from any and every angle. A player executing a tackle in such a way that they don't violate any of the rules of hockey referred to above, is a player executing a good tackle.

The bad


A tackle that breaks any of the above rules is the yin to the yang of a good tackle. It's as simple as that, if it's not a good tackle, then it's a poor tackle. One or the other. Never both.

The ugly

These are the tackles that go further than a simple 'technical' breach of the rules. They are dangerous. They are deliberate. They intentionally break down play. They are reckless. They are overly physical. They take an opponent to the ground. They have the potential to cause injury. Judge them for what they are, not where they originate. Umpires must deal with them appropriately, sending a clear message, protecting players and ensuring that the game is played safely and fairly.

There is no wrong side to tackle from...only wrong ways to tackle.
