NFHS Coaches Code Of Ethics

The function of a coach is to educate students through participation in interscholastic competition. An interscholastic program should be designed to enhance academic achievement and should never interfere with opportunities for academic success. Each student should be treated with the utmost respect, and his or her welfare should be considered in decisions by the coach at all times. Accordingly, the following guidelines for coaches have been adopted by the NFHS Board of Directors.

- The coach shall be aware that he or she has a tremendous influence, for either good or ill, on the education of the student and, thus, shall never place the value of winning above the value of instilling the highest ideals of character.
- The coach shall uphold the honor and dignity of the profession. In all personal contact with students, officials, athletic directors, school administrators, the state high school athletic association, the media, and the public, the coach shall strive to set an example of the highest ethical and moral conduct.
- The coach shall take an active role in the prevention of drug, alcohol and tobacco abuse.
- The coach shall avoid the use of alcohol and tobacco products when in contact with players.
- The coach shall promote the entire interscholastic program of the school and direct his or her program in harmony with the total school program.
- The coach shall master the contest rules and shall teach them to his or her team members. The coach shall not seek an advantage by circumvention of the spirit or letter of the rules.
- The coach shall exert his or her influence to enhance sportsmanship by spectators, both directly and by working closely with cheerleaders, pep club sponsors, booster clubs, and administrators.
- The coach shall respect and support contest officials. The coach shall not indulge in conduct which would incite players or spectators against the officials. Public criticism of officials or players is unethical.
- The coach should meet and exchange cordial greetings with the opposing coach to set the correct tone for the event before and after the contest.
- The coach shall not exert pressure on faculty members to give student special consideration.
- The coach shall not scout opponents by any means other than those adopted by the league and/or state high school athletic association.

Clarification for determining Heat Index/ Wind Chill in your zip code:

1. Log onto **AccuWeather.com** by using the association website, www.nysphsaa.org, we recommend saving this site to your computer or phone.
2. Once you have entered the zip code for your practice or contest site you will see the home page for the local forecast. DO NOT USE THE TEMPERATURE on this page.
3. Click onto **Hourly Forecast**, and you will be linked to a chart similar to the one below. Please use the current hour RealFeel temperature for your zip code to take the appropriate action for your practice or contest.

WIND CHILL PROCEDURES

Administration of Wind Chill Procedures:

- Wind Chill will be checked 1 hour before the contest/practice by a certified athletic trainer, athletic director, or school designee when the air temperature is 39 degrees (Fahrenheit) or lower.
- The athletic trainer, athletic director, or school designee will use the accuweather.com website to determine the heat index for the area of the contest/practice. The accuweather.com website can be reached through the NYSPHSAA website. Once a person is on the accuweather.com website, they will put in the zip code for the location of the contest/practice and the website will give them the air temperature as well as the RealFeel temperature (wind chill).
- If the RealFeel temperature (wind chill) is 10 degrees or below, the athletic trainer, athletic director, or school designee must re-check the RealFeel (wind chill) at halftime or midway point of the contest. If the RealFeel (wind chill) temperature is -11 degrees (Fahrenheit) or lower, the contest will be suspended.

Please refer to the following chart to take the appropriate actions:

	RealFeel (wind chill) above 40 degrees	Full activity. No restrictions
RECOMMENDED	Wind Chill Caution: RealFeel (wind chill) 36 degrees to 20 degrees	Stay adequately hydrated. Notify coaches of the threat of cold related illnesses. Have students and coaches dress in layers of clothing.
	Wind Chill Watch: RealFeel (wind chill) 19 degrees to 10 degrees	Stay adequately hydrated. Notify coaches of the threat of cold related illnesses. Have students and coaches dress in layers of clothing. Cover the head and neck to prevent heat loss.
	Wind Chill Warning: RealFeel (wind chill) 9 degrees to -10 degrees	Stay adequately hydrated. Notify coaches of the threat of cold related illnesses. Have students and coaches dress in layers of clothing. Cover the head and neck to prevent heat loss. Consider postponing practice to a time when RealFeel temp is much higher. Consider reducing the amount of time for an outdoor practice session.
REQUIRED	Wind Chill Alert: RealFeel (wind chill) -11 degrees or lower	No outside activity, practice or contest, should be held.

Special Note: Alpine Skiing will be exempt from this policy and will follow the regulations of the host ski center where the practice or event is being held.

Approved May 1, 2010

THUNDER & LIGHTNING POLICY:

October 2001

Applied to regular season through NYSPHSAA Finals:

1. Thunder and lightning necessitates that contest be suspended. The occurrence of thunder and/or lightning is not subject to interpretation or discussion- thunder is thunder, lightning is lightning.

a. With your site administrator, set up a plan for shelter prior to the start of any contest.

2. When thunder is heard and/or lightning is seen or when using the My Lightning Tracker App, if lightning is detected within 15 miles of the event location (Jan. 2024), the following procedures should be adhered to:

a. Suspend play and direct participants to go to shelter, a building normally occupied by the public or if a building is unavailable, participants should go inside a vehicle with a solid metal top (e.g. bus, van, and car).

b. Do not permit people to stand under or near a tree; and have all stay away from poles, antennas, towers and underground watering systems.

c. After the last boom is heard, strike is seen or lightning has not been detected within 15 miles of the event by using the My Lightning Tracker

EMERGENCY ACTION PLAN: Required by NYSPHSAA and Section 8 for injuries or unforeseen emergencies.

All FH coaches are to check with their AD and familiarize themselves with the plan/s. Plans will be in place for Final games.



Concussions: The Invisible Injury

Student and Parent Information Sheet

CONCUSSION DEFINITION

A concussion is a reaction by the brain to a jolt or force that can be transmitted to the head by an impact or blow occurring anywhere on the body. Essentially a concussion results from the brain moving back and forth or twisting rapidly inside the skull.

FACTS ABOUT CONCUSSIONS ACCORDING TO THE CENTER FOR DISEASE CONTROL (CDC)

- An estimated 4 million people under age 19 sustain a head injury annually. Of these approximately 52,000 die and 275,000 are hospitalized.
- An estimated 300,000 sports and recreation related concussions occur each year.
- Students who have had at least one concussion are at increased risk for another concussion.

In New York State in 2009, approximately 50,500 children under the age of 19 visited the emergency room for a traumatic brain injury and of those approximately 3,000 were hospitalized.

REQUIREMENTS OF SCHOOL DISTRICTS

Education:

- Each school coach, physical education teacher, nurse, and athletic trainer will have to complete an approved course on concussion management on a biennial basis, starting with the 2012-2013 school year.
 - * School coaches and physical education teachers must complete the CDC course. (www.cdc.gov/concussion/HeadsUp/online_training.html)
 - * School nurses and certified athletic trainers must complete the concussion course. (<http://preventingconcussions.org>)

Information:

- Provide concussion management information and sign off with any parental permission form.
- The concussion management and awareness information or the State Education Department's web site must be made available on the school web site, if one exists.

Removal from athletics:

- Require the immediate removal from athletic activities of any pupil that has or is believed to have sustained a mild traumatic brain injury.
- No pupils will be allowed to resume athletic activity until they have been symptom free for 24 hours and have been evaluated by and received written and signed authorization from a licensed physician. For interscholastic athletics, clearance must come from the school medical director.
 - * Such authorization must be kept in the pupil's permanent health record.
 - * Schools shall follow directives issued by the pupil's treating physician.

SYMPTOMS

Symptoms of a concussion are the result of a temporary change in the brain's function. In most cases, the symptoms of a concussion generally resolve over a short period of time; however, in some cases, symptoms will last for weeks or longer. Children and adolescents are more susceptible to concussions and take longer than adults to recover.

It is imperative that any student who is suspected of having a concussion is removed from athletic activity (e.g. recess, PE class, sports) and remains out of such activities until evaluated and cleared to return to activity by a physician.

Symptoms include, but are not limited to:

- Decreased or absent memory of events prior to or immediately after the injury, or difficulty retaining new information
- Confusion or appears dazed
- Headache or head pressure
- Loss of consciousness
- Balance difficulties, dizziness, or clumsy movements
- Double or blurry vision
- Sensitivity to light and/or sound
- Nausea, vomiting and/or loss of appetite
- Irritability, sadness or other changes in personality
- Feeling sluggish, foggy or light-headed
- Concentration or focusing problems
- Drowsiness
- Fatigue and/or sleep issues – sleeping more or less than usual

Students who develop any of the following signs, or if signs and symptoms worsen, should be seen and evaluated immediately at the nearest hospital emergency room.

- Headaches that worsen
- Seizures
- Looks drowsy and/or cannot be awakened
- Repeated vomiting
- Slurred speech
- Unable to recognize people or places
- Weakness or numbing in arms or legs, facial drooping
- Unsteady gait
- Change in pupil size in one eye
- Significant irritability
- Any loss of consciousness
- Suspicion for skull fracture: blood draining from ear or clear fluid from the nose



SPORTSMANSHIP

The Association recognizes and appreciates that the influence and responsibility of the school administration with regard to good sportsmanship extends to all levels of competition. However, it must also be seen that the NYSPHSAA has been vested with the responsibility to ensure that all contests under its jurisdiction are conducted satisfactorily. This standard applies to all regular season and post schedule play.

a. Coach:

1. Any coach excluded by a certified official from an interschool competition for unsportsmanlike conduct, including taunting, is ineligible to coach any interschool competition in that sport until after the next previously scheduled contest at the same level (e.g. junior varsity, varsity, etc.) has been completed. In individual sports a multi-day contest is considered to be a contest. Disqualification from one season carries over to the next season of participation. The coach may not be present at the game site nor communicate in any manner during the contest with any person present at the site.

NOTE: "Not being physically present at the site" means the disqualified coach is not to be present in the locker room, on the sidelines, in the stands or site area before, during or after the game/meet. (see Taunting, p. 90, Next Previously Scheduled Contest, p. 89) Any coach that does not serve the penalty for violating the Sportsmanship Standard will be ineligible to participate in the next two regularly scheduled contests. If the coach continues to not serve the penalty, the matter will be referred to the Section for further action. If the coach is involved in the NYSPHSAA play-offs, the matter will be referred to the Executive Director of the NYSPHSAA.

Any coach:

1. Who receives a disqualification penalty in a sport shall not participate in the next regularly scheduled contest;
2. Who receives a second disqualification penalty in the same sport in the same season shall not participate in the next two regularly scheduled contests; and
3. Who receives a third disqualification penalty in the same sport in the same season will not be allowed to participate for the rest of the season. If the disqualification penalty takes place in the last contest of the season (regular season or post schedule play), the Section Athletic Council will assess the penalty carrying over into the next season of participation.

2. A coach who strikes, shoves, kicks or makes other physical contact with the intent to annoy, harass or intimidate another person (e.g. official, another coach, player, fan) shall be expelled immediately and banned from further participation or coaching in all sports for a period of time to be determined by the section not to exceed one year from the date of the offense.

b. Player:

1. Any member of a squad disqualified by a sport official for unsportsmanlike conduct, including taunting, or for a flagrant foul shall not participate in that sport in the next previously scheduled contest with a member school or in NYSPHSAA tournament play. In individual sports a multi-day contest is considered to be a contest. The contest in which the athlete was disqualified must count in the total maximum number of contests permitted. Disqualifications from one season carry over to the next season of participation. (see Taunting, p. 90, Next Previously Scheduled Contest, p. 89)

Any player:

1. Who receives a disqualification penalty in a sport shall not participate in the next regularly scheduled contest;
2. Who receives a second disqualification penalty in the same sport in the same season shall not participate in the next two regularly scheduled contests; and
3. Who receives a third disqualification penalty in the same sport in the same season will not be allowed to participate for the rest of the season. If the third ejection takes place in the last contest of the season (regular season or post schedule play), the Section Athletic Council will assess the penalty carrying over into the next season of participation.

2. Any member of the squad who strikes, shoves, kicks or makes other physical contact with the intent to annoy, harass or intimidate an official shall be expelled from the game immediately and banned from further participation in all sports for a period of time to be determined by the section not to exceed one year from the date of the offense. **NOTE:** Member of the squad includes player, manager, score keepers, timers, and statisticians.

c. Official:

1. Unprofessional conduct on the part of the official such as, but not limited to, taunting, baiting, use of profanity, shall be reported by a school administrator from the aggrieved school to the section executive director. A request will be made to the appropriate sport officials chapter to investigate the incidence and to report their action to the section in a timely manner.

YELLOW CARD:

- ***Corner:*** a player who has sat out for the 5 minute penalty may enter on corner as long as she does not delay play. She is not considered a substitute and can reenter the field anytime.
- ***Overtime:*** If a yellow card penalty extends into overtime, the carded players name may be one of the 7 in the book and the team plays short. Once her penalty is served, she can go on to the field. If the yellow carded player is not involved in the overtime, the coach determines which player will sit out for the penalty and the team plays short until the penalty is completed *Ref NYSPHSAA FIELD HOCKEY MEETING Nov 21 2009*

EMERGENCY ACTION PLAN: Required by NYSPHSAA and Section 8 for injuries or unforeseen emergencies. All FH coaches are to check with their AD and familiarize themselves with the plan/s. Plans will be in place for Final games.

UNIFORMS/PLAYER EQUIPMENT/WAIVER:

HAIR ADORNMENTS/CONTROL: legal as long as they are not dangerous as per official.

JEWELRY is permitted as long as it is not considered dangerous as per official.

RELIGIOUS HEAD DRESS: LEGAL

SUN BLOCK: may be black OR school colors (ex blue and gold), **MUST** be used as intended by the manufacturer (placed below the eye), it may **NOT** be extended down the cheeks or on the face, it **MAY** DENOTE SCHOOL INITIALS OR MASCOT.

UNIFORMS/WAIVER: *All uniforms must meet 2025 NFHSFH rules. Teams with financial issues must apply for a WAIVER from NYSPHSAA PRIOR to the first game. WAIVER is required for PINK SHIRTS/SHINGUARDS/SOCKS*

GOALIE SHIRT: NUMBER MUST COMPLY WITH RULE BOOK

SHIRT COLORS: NOTE 2025 game shirt colors: Home is DARK, Visitor is WHITE

GOLD is NOT a dark color for team shirts Ref. *NYSPHSAA 1/11/0*

GOGGLES & DEFENSIVE FACE MASKS: 2020 GOGGLES MAY BE WORN no FH ASTM stamp required. **DEFENSIVE FACE MASK: FACE MASKS ARE PERMITTED BUT WIRED MASKS MUST BE REMOVED BEFORE THE PLAYER WITH THE BALL BRINGS THE BALL OVER THE 25 YD LINE** no FH ASTM stamp required

SCRIMMAGE DEFINITION

NYSPHSAA as of January 2010

THESE GUIDELINES MUST BE USED FOR ALL NYSPHSAA FIELD HOCKEY SCRIMMAGES

The following is definition of a Field Hockey scrimmage has been approved and will appear in the 2010-2012 NYSPHSAA Handbook.

FIELD HOCKEY: A field hockey scrimmage must start with a sideline or 16 yard hit and includes *one or more* of the following:

1. A running clock and/or modified periods
2. Incorporate all or part of the Overtime Procedure into the scrimmage
3. Each team will take 5 offensive corners, playing until either a goal is scored; ball goes out of bounds or crosses the 25yd line.

5 GOAL DIFFERENTIAL RULE-----FOR RUNNING CLOCK:

NYSPHAA FH policy: When a team is beating another team by 5 or more goals, **THE CLOCK WILL RUN AFTER GOALS.**

SECTION VIII SCORE DIFFERENTIAL POLICY: When a field hockey score reaches a differential of 6, the coach and players of the team with the higher score will attempt to reduce the possibility of scoring additional goals. If the score becomes a differential of 7, the team should know it is time to work with the ball instead of shooting at the goal. Coaches must have a signal or plan ready to implement since there are no timeouts except for halftime. Game final score with a differential of 8 or more are to be reported to the coordinator and the Exec. Dir. (Each differential is sport specific)

NOISEMAKERS: noisemakers are not permitted at during any game or contest.

MAXIMUM NUMBER OF GAMES: 16

PRACTICE DAYS: 6 days of PRACTICES PRIOR TO GAME OR SCRIMMAGE

TEAMS MAY NOT PRACTICE OR PLAY 7 DAYS IN A ROW—during regular season

(SAME AS 2024)**

FOLLOW ALL OF THE NYS FH OT Pg. 17, 18 & 19---EXCEPT: OMIT III (no second 10 min 7v7)

- ☞ **ONLY USE 1 TEN MINUTE 7V7 OVERTIME PERIOD**
- ☞ **IF A TIE STILL REMAINS after 1 ten minute 7v7: GO DIRECTLY TO 1V1 SHOOTOUT**
- ☞ **ONE TIMEOUT IS ALLOWED DURING OVERTIME AS PER NYSPHSAA FH**

ALL OTHER NYSPHSAA FH OT RULES ARE IN EFFECT

TIMERS: When the official timer is in the booth, ***ANOTHER PERSON HAS TO TIME THE PENALTIES FROM THE TABLE.*** If the school does not have another person, TIME must be kept at the table.

HOME team is to provide the official timer and scorekeeper at the table.

If there is enough room at the table for social distancing, the visiting team may have a scorekeeper at the table.

EMERGENCY ACTION PLAN: Required by NYSPHSAA and Section 8 for injuries or unforeseen emergencies. All FH coaches are to check with their AD and familiarize themselves with the plan/s. Plans will be in place for Final games.

Field Hockey Rules Changes - 2025

BY NFHS ON JUNE 23, 2025 | FIELD HOCKEY, RULES CHANGE

1-5-1b: Switches the required home and away team uniform colors to allow the home team to wear a dark-colored uniform top that showcases the primary school colors.

Rationale: Allowing the home team to wear dark colors gives them the ability to showcase their primary team colors at their home location. Consistent with other NFHS rule books and national governing bodies.

1-6-5: Allows a wire-caged style penalty corner face mask to be worn when defending a penalty corner.

Rationale: Allows the option of wearing a wire-caged penalty corner face mask during a penalty corner. Failure to remove the wire-caged mask beyond the 25-yard area results in a player misconduct. Rule 1-6 PENALTIES, Rule 8-2-1j PENALTIES.

4-4-3: Adjusts when a substitution is allowed during a penalty corner.

Rationale: Clarifies when a substitution is allowed on a penalty corner, including in a retaken corner situation.

8-2-1 PENALTIES 2 (NEW): Establishes a misconduct penalty for a goalkeeper uniform violation.

Rationale: Aligns with the 2024 rules change to the goalkeeper uniform penalty, clarifying how to assess a misconduct penalty for a goalkeeper uniform violation.

11-2-7: Aligns penalty stroke end of game procedures with penalty corner procedures and clarifies when the stroke should be awarded.

Rationale: Brings language for penalty stroke end of game procedures in line with penalty corner procedures.

**Field Hockey Overtime Procedures
2025 (SAME AS 2024)**

TEAMS ARE ALLOWED ONE TIMEOUT as per NYSPHSAA

SECTION 8 REGULAR SEASSON OT DOES NOT USE III BELOW if a tie exists after II, go directly to IV

- I. At the end of the regulation game, there will be a coaching intermission that will last up to 5 minutes.
The Officials will:
- Meet with Captains and Coach.
 - Toss of coin: the **Visiting team** calls the toss. The winner of the toss gets choice of possession OR end of field.
 - The tableside official remains the head official for all segments of the overtime procedures.

II. Ten minute OT 7 V 7 sudden victory OT period:

- Rolling substitutions are permitted.
- Each team is permitted one time out during the 10-minute overtime period
- Defensive corners during 7 v 7:
- Defense will be reduced to 4 players (3 plus goalie) behind end line
- The remaining defensive player goes behind the 50 yd line with the rest of the team.
- The attack remains the same.

III. ONLY USE III IN PLAYOFFS If a tie still exists after the first 10 minute overtime, the teams will play a second 10 minute

7 V 7 Sudden Victory overtime period.

- A coaching intermission, lasting 5 minutes, will be allowed prior to the start of the second OT period.
- Teams will change ends of the field, the team not having possession at the start of the first OT shall have possession to start the second OT.
- each team is allowed one time out.
- Rolling substitution are permitted.
- Defensive corners same as above.
- The attack remains the same.

IV. If the score remains tied at the end of the second 10 minute overtime period; a Shoot-out will take place.

A set of 5 alternating shoot outs take place in each series. A full set of 5 is played.

- Players from each team take a 1v1 shoot-out, alternately against the goalkeeper of the other team.
- Five (5) players per team will take the shoot-out in the sequence nominated and communicated by the team to the umpires on duty before the start of the shoot-out competition. The order of shoot-out must be indicated to the umpires at the coin toss.
- The umpires, in conjunction with the tournament committee will choose the goal to be used.
- Toss of coin: The **Visiting team** calls the toss. The team which wins the toss has the choice to take or defend the first shoot-out.

1. The team scoring or awarded the most goals is the winner and the competition ceases once an outright winner is determined. Winner is declared: when there is a clear winner and play is not necessary to finish the group of 5. ex: during the 1st group of five 1v1 scenarios, the score is 4-1, there is no need to play out the last two players.

PLAYERS AND COACHES—

- When not involved in play, the Goalkeeper may stand on the end line on the side of the goal closest to her team OR may stand behind the 25 yd line with the 5 players involved in the shootout.
 - Team members, and coaches not involved in the shootout, may stand on the field, behind the 30 yd. line, 5-10 yards from the sideline. One team on each side of the field.
 - PLAYERS should be ready for the next shootout, but not raced into the set up.
 - If the goalie is a shooter, she is considered a field player.
- A player who has been excluded permanently (red card) from the field of play during that same match, cannot take part in any shoot-out competition.
 - A team with a player who was carded during the shootout, must play short in the shootout period.

V. Shootout:

OFFICIALS:

- Lead and Trail officials will call the shootout.
- Lead official during regulation time will continue to be lead regardless of which goal is chosen.
- Table official will keep time.
- If Sectional games have a Certified *Table official*, the *Table official* will keep the time. If a Certified Official is not assigned to the table during Sectional games, the timer will turn her/his back to the field and start the 10 seconds with the official's whistle. The official time will be kept on the field.
- Officials should not feel they have to move the 1v1 along. Officials should scan both benches, allowing players and coaches a reasonable amount of time to set up for each shootout.

PROCEDURE:

- The goalkeeper starts on or behind the goal line between the posts.
- The ball is placed on the nearest 25 yd line opposite the center of the goal.
- The attacker stands outside the 25 yd line near the ball.
- The umpire blows the whistle to signal the start of the shootout; the attacker and the goalkeeper may then move in any direction.
- The shoot-out is completed under the following conditions:
 - **10** seconds has elapsed.
 - The attacker scores a goal.
 - The attacker commits a foul.
 - The goalkeeper commits an unintentional foul in which case the shoot-out is re-taken.
 - The goalkeeper commits an intentional foul, in which case a penalty stroke is awarded.
 - The ball goes out of play over the back-line or side-line; this includes the goalkeeper intentionally playing the ball over the back-line (not a foul). The ball simply going outside the circle a second time does not constitute the end of a shoot-out.

Replacement situations

- If a penalty stroke is awarded as specified above, it is taken by the two players involved in the shoot-out concerned, unless either of them is incapacitated or suspended. This penalty stroke will take place before the next available shoot-out takes place.
- If the replacement goalkeeper is a field player, that player is allowed reasonable time to put on protective equipment.
- If during a shoot-out competition, a defending goalkeeper is incapacitated, that goalkeeper may be replaced by

another goalkeeper.

- If during the shoot-out competition, an attacker is incapacitated, that attacker may be replaced by another player from the team unless suspended by the umpire prior to or during the shoot-out competition.

VI. **If a tie still exists after the first series of 5 shoot-out, a second series of 5 shoot-outs** will take place.

- Coaches may change the order and/or players before the start of the second shootout.
- A coaching intermission lasting 2 minutes, will be allowed prior to the start of the second shoot-out period.
- The coach must inform the umpires as to the order in which the nominated players take the shoot-out.
- The team who had taken the first shoot-out of the first series must defend the second series.

****If a tie still exists after a second series of 5 shootouts, Sudden Victory of 5 additional shoot-outs are taken. (Follow the same process criteria as above.)**

VII. **Misconduct:**

1. Each team will begin the first 7v7 overtime with seven players, one of which must be a Goalkeeper, (unless players were disqualified or have not completed a suspension during any previous playing period. Teams will play short during this time.)
2. Any player who has been disqualified (Red Carded) during regulation play is not eligible for the overtime period and the team will play short for the entire overtime.
3. A player suspended (Green/Yellow Carded) during regulation play, would be eligible at the completion of the suspension timeframe of the 7v7 periods. The team plays short until the suspension is completed.
4. At the beginning of the first round of 1v1shootout, a suspended player with time that is carried over into the 1v1 shootout round will be unable to participate in any future shootout rounds. **Teams will start the 1 v1 shootout with 5 players.**
5. If an Attack player is Green / Yellow carded **during** the shootout, that player may be replaced with an eligible shooter to participate in any future shoot outs. However the player carded will be unable to participate in any future shootout rounds. Any further player who is carded during the shootout will follow the same procedure.
6. If an Attack player is Red carded **during** the shootout, their team will only have 4 shooters participate in any future shootouts. The player carded will be unable to participate in any future shootout rounds. Any future shoot-out the player was entitled to take counts as no goal. The spot of the no goal in future shootouts will be determined by the carded player's coach.
7. If a goalie is carded **during** the shootout, she is replaced and is unable to participate in any future rounds. The replacement goalkeeper is allowed reasonable time to put on protective equipment. If the goalie is Red carded, she will be replaced and is unable to participate in any future rounds. An Attack player will be removed from the shootout series and her spot in future shootouts will count as a no goal. The spot of the no goal in future shootouts will be determined by the carded player's coach.
8. It is expected that the players and coaches will not enter the field of play until the official has signaled the end of the game or overtime. Failure to comply will be treated as misconduct.

20 varsity teams, of diverse skill levels, play field hockey in Section 8

The schedule is created by ability, using a combination of two conferences and four leagues (all by ability) for regular season play.

Conferences and Leagues have worked for years in Section 8 FH and is the best alignment for the sport.

All teams have a chance to make playoffs.

Points for Conference and League play will be used for ranking and count toward playoffs.

Number of games: All teams will have 13 games

Playoffs:

There are 3 classes in NYSPHSAA Field Hockey

A team in a lower League cannot be seeded above a team in a higher League.

Conference 1 teams: All teams in Conference 1 qualify for playoffs.

Conference 2 teams: the top team in Class A, B & C in Conference 2 will qualify for playoffs and fill in the brackets

Conference 2 Teams with a 500 or better record qualify for playoffs and fill in the brackets or first round games.

TIE RECORDS: IF TEAMS HAVE A TIE RECORD for playoffs

The following criteria will be reviewed:

1. Head to Head competition

4. First round game will be used if needed

- If the score is tie at the end of regulation time, one 10 minute sudden victory OT will be played

PROTEST PROCEDURE: A protest **CANNOT** BE filed on a judgment call, only the application of the rules. **Schools filing a protest in Field Hockey MUST contact the FH Coordinator by 9 PM the day of the game. Protests should be resolved on the field if possible.** *See Section 8 Directory for entire procedure.* Protests must be written in the score books and signed by both coaches and officials **IMMEDIATELY FOLLOWING THE CALL INVOLVED, BEFORE THE NEXT PLAY.** This is to acknowledge that a protest has been made.

SCHEDULES: are posted on the BOCES website with officials assigned

GAMES CHANGED for weather etc, **MUST** be rescheduled on the next date that officials are available.

SUNDAYS ARE APPROVED DAYS FOR RESCHEDULING GAMES

SUSPENDED GAME: As per the rules of the game: If a game, during the regular season is suspended during the first half, the game shall resume from the point of interruption. If the game is interrupted after the completion of the first half, the game is completed. **For Playoffs**, all games will be played in two full halves---when possible.

WAIVERS: For uniforms or equipment that do not conform to the rules

To receive a waiver the AD must request a special equipment waiver from Todd Nelsen NYSPHSAA and carry it with you always. You only have to show it if you are questioned. You will need waiver:

- If you have players who wear head dresses for religious reason.
- Pink game shirts/shinguards/socks must have a waiver from NYSPHSAA

COACHES and all team personnel CANNOT STAND CLOSER TO THE FIELD THAN THE 5 YD TEAM AREA. MUST STAY IN THE TEAM AREA as per NFHS FH RULES.

TEAM AREA: The NYSPHSAA Field Hockey extends the team area to allow for **LARGE** squads.

COACHES: MUST REMAIN IN THE NFHS DEFINED AREA shown in the field diagram.

It is suggested that players be instructed to stand/sit at the back line of the team area so the coaches will have space to move within the team area.

Player and team equipment bags should be behind the back line of the team area.

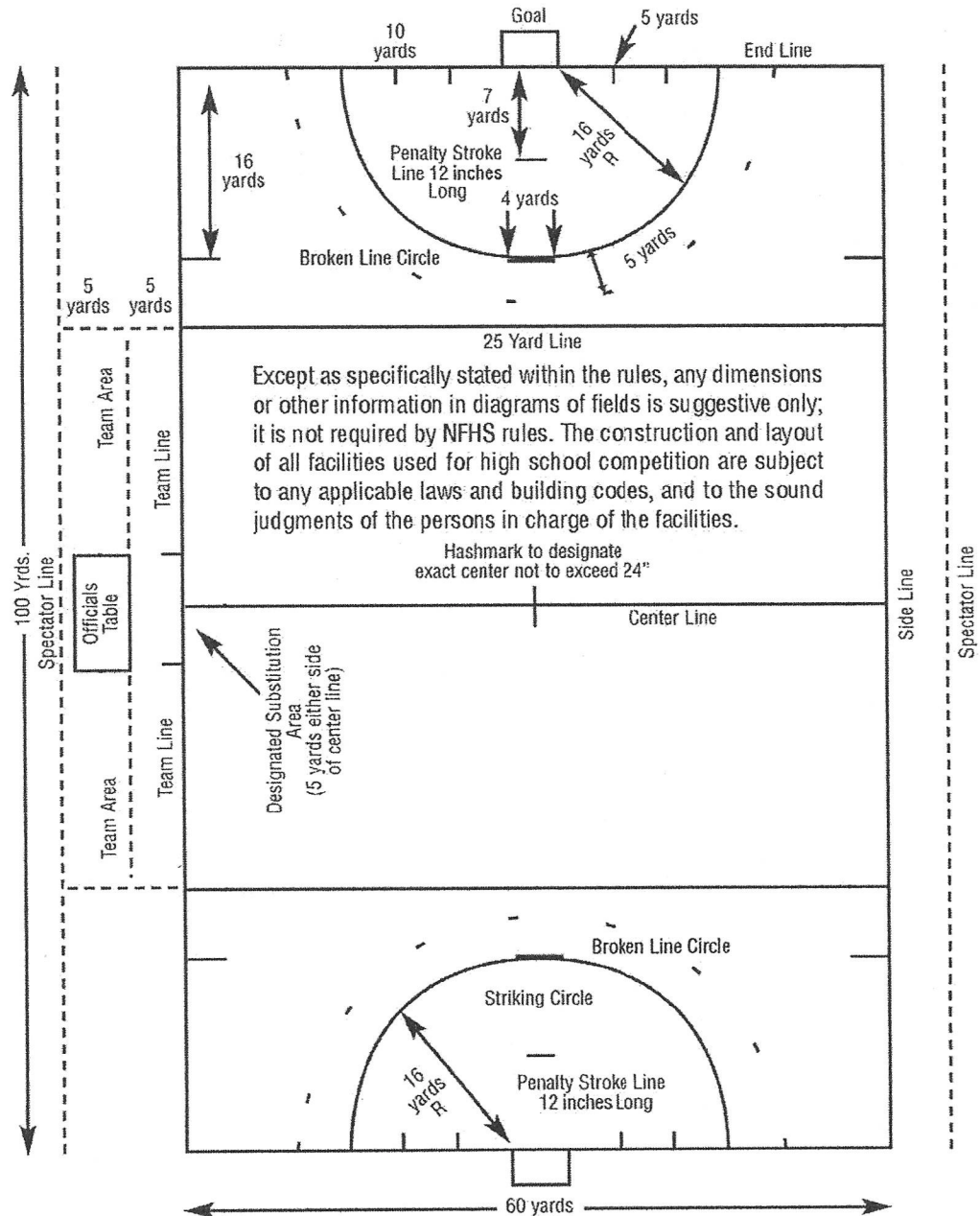

FIELD HOCKEY PLAYOFF INFORMATION 2025

OFFICIALS FOR PLAYOFFS: prior to the end of the season, Section 8 will send each school an OFFICIALS' RANKING SHEET: THIS FORM MUST TO BE RETURNED TO THE SECTION OFFICE AND BARB SELLERS. This information will be used to assign officials to playoff games, LIC and States.

ALL TEAMS FROM CONF 1 ARE IN THE PLAYOFFS

Class A: 4 teams are eligible for Semi finals/Finals

Class B: 4 teams are eligible for Semi finals/Finals

Class C: 4 teams are eligible for Semi final/Finals

GAME CLOCK: Coaches, please educate your spectators to avoid confusion

GAME RULES: All regular game rules will apply

REMINDER: all shin guards must be as close to knee high as possible and all team members MUST have the same color (appropriate to team uniform)

UNIFORMS: if it is cold, make sure that your team is legal.

If your players are wearing long sleeves under their game shirts, **only the home team can wear white long sleeves** the away team must wear black or dark colored sleeves, the team members must all be in the same color.

GOALIE HELMETS/ MOUTHGUARD/THROAT PROTECTOR:

HELMET MUST be **Field Hockey** approved: double check to make sure it is not a lacrosse helmet. MUST have a mouthguard and wrap around throat protector.

INTERRUPTED GAMES:

Once a game has started, the officials are in charge of the game. They will make every attempt to see that the game continues. If the game has to be stopped, due to weather, the game will be continued from the point of interruption. **Playoff games are not complete after the first half during playoffs.** Every attempt will be made to use the same site and the same officials if a game has to continue on the next day.

NOISEMAKERS: the use of noisemakers is prohibited.

All schools are to inform their spectators.

PROTESTS: A protest must be filed immediately, as per Section 8 rules. (A protest cannot be filed once the game play continues or the game is over).

If it is not possible to resolve the protest at that time, the game will continue after the protest has been documented by both coaches and both officials. (Signing a protest statement by the opposing coach or officials does not mean that those people agree with the protest) At the end of the game, the protesting team must declare their intention to continue or drop the protest. The Section Coordinator must be notified immediately following the game.

FINAL GAMES: A protest will be resolved immediately by the onsite protest committee.

ROSTERS:

Section 8 Rosters are to be emailed to Sandy Jozefowski immediately for all POTENTIAL teams in Sectional playoff games.

THERE **MAY** BE A PRINTED PROGRAM FOR FINAL GAMES but a program will be available from the NCFHCA. PROGRAM INFORMATION MAY BE OBTAINED BY CONTACTING SANDY

SEEDING CRITERIA: see approved proposal in Handbook pg. 20, 21 & 22

SITES: The HIGH SEED will be the home site for Semi Finals and follow all normal procedures for a home game.

SCHOOL SUPERVISORS are required. See pg 34 **All teams MUST provide at least 2 supervisors**

SUPERVISORS must be visible and prepared to control spectators as necessary
SEE ATTACHED RESPONSIBILITY SHEET pg. 34

TIE BREAKING/OVERTIME:

The **ENTIRE OVERTIME PROCEDURE** will be used for post season play as needed

Athletic Directors, it is your responsibility to give school photographer the instructions on pg 39

No one is allowed behind the goal cage or end lines (rules of the game) Please inform your school photographers.

PROTEST COMMITTEES FINAL GAMES: Will be on site. Protest will be resolved before play continues.

RESTROOMS: Restrooms will be open in the building behind the Concession Stand.

SCOREBOOK: Each team provides a scorekeeper. **The home team scorekeeper** will sit at the official table.

SPECTATORS: Spectators must be in the bleachers on the opposite side from the team benches.

SUPERVISORS: All teams MUST provide at least 2 supervisors

SUPERVISORS must be visible and prepared to control spectators as necessary
SEE RESPONSIBILITY SHEET pg. 33

TEAM AREAS: (looking at the field from the table) HOME team has the bench to the right of the table. Visiting team has the bench to the left of the table. Only coaches, players, manager, score keepers and trainers will be allowed in the team area. **NO EXTRA PERSONNEL WILL BE ALLOWED ON THE FIELD.**

Athletic Directors who would like to be on the field must be **behind the designated team area** which is: 5 yards from the sideline, between the 45 and 25 yd lines.

No one may stand below the 25 yd line.

TRAINER: TEAMS do their own taping. **FINAL GAMES:** Section cannot guarantee a trainer.

TRACK: Except for teams, **NO ONE IS ALLOWED ON THE TRACK AT BERNER**

VIDEOTAPING: Only from the bleachers or outside the fenced area. There is NO access to the press box or it's roof.

Videotaping is allowed from anywhere in the bleachers as long as it does not block the view of paying spectators. Top rows are suggested.

WATER AND ICE: Teams are to bring their own water, cups and ice to the field for all playoff games, including Finals and Regionals..

FIELD HOCKEY 2025 SUPERVISOR RESPONSIBILITIES

FOR ALL PLAYOFF GAMES

All schools are required to supply at least 2 supervisors to all post season games.

Supervisors are to be visible, IN THE BLEACHERS with their school's spectators, and wearing distinguishing attire.

Supervisors are to make sure all spectators are in the bleachers.

No one is allowed on the field or track except team personnel

Supervisors are required to make sure that the spectators are using appropriate encouragement of their team and not making derogatory comments.

The Supervisors will remove any spectator from the field/ stadium if such a request is made from the officials

If a game goes to Overtime 1 vs. goalie: All Spectators **MUST**: be kept away from the field **AND** stand on the sideline between the 25 & 50 yd. lines

(Keep them away from the goal end of the field)

Enforce NO NOISEMAKERS

NO TAILGATING: Supervisors must stay with the group and make sure that they leave in a timely fashion.

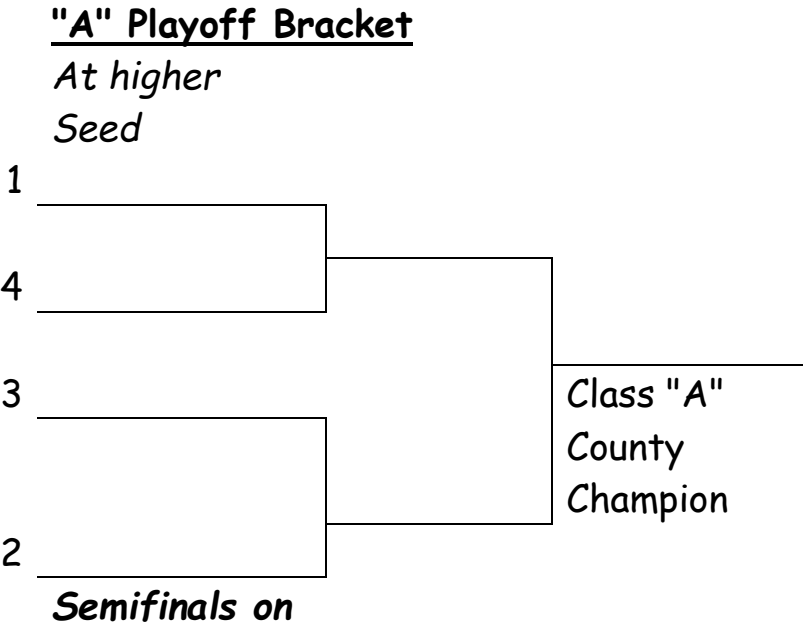

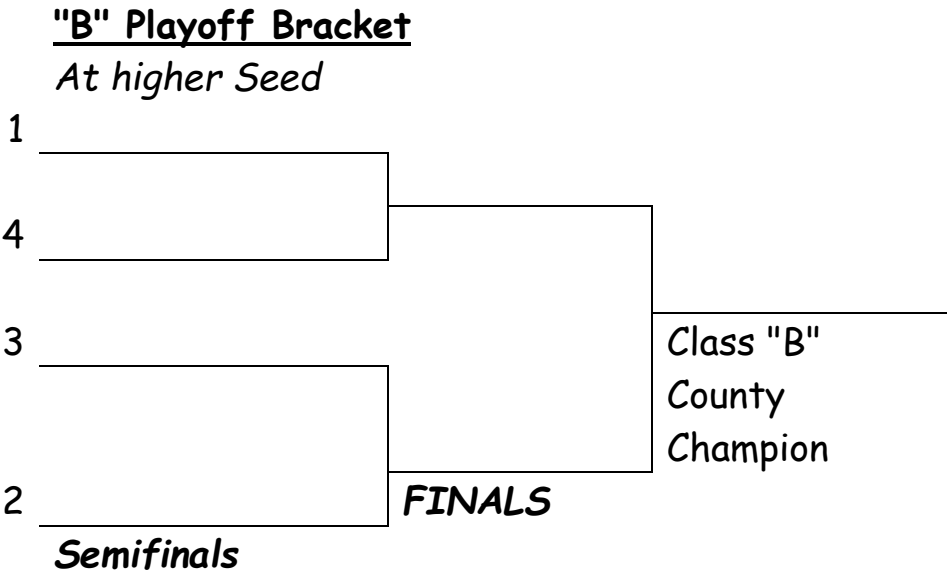

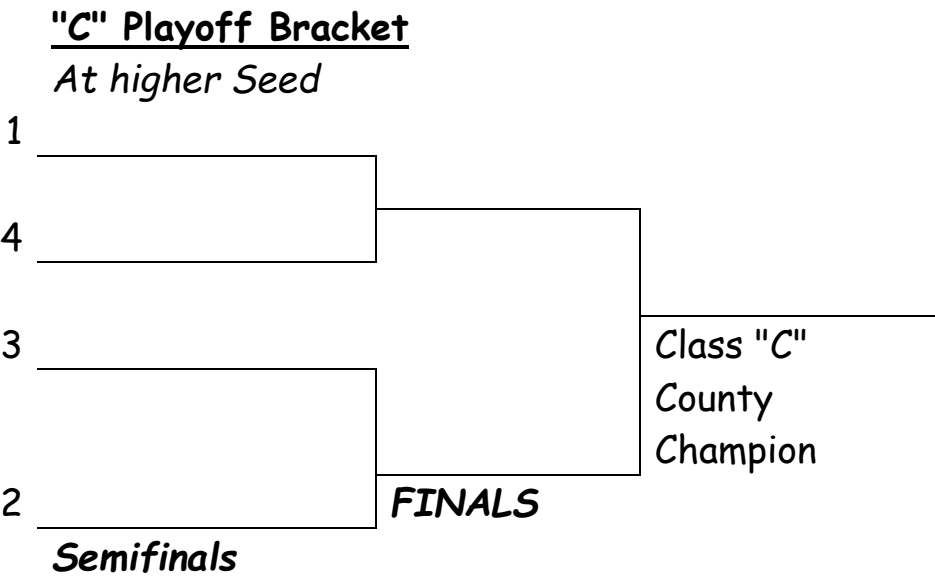

SECTION 8 FIELD HOCKEY FINAL GAMES

INSTRUCTIONS TO ALL PHOTOGRAPHERS:

1. YOU MUST PRODUCE CREDENTIALS, FROM YOUR SCHOOL OR ORGANIZATION TO GAIN ACCESS TO THE FIELD.
2. PHOTOGRAPHERS MAY BE DENIED ACCESS TO THE FIELD
3. ALL CAMERA BAGS, TRIPODS ETC, MUST BE WITH THE PHOTOGRAPHER AT ALL TIMES.
4. NO ONE IS ALLOWED TO STAND BEHIND THE GOAL/ENDLINE
5. PHOTOGRAPHERS MUST stand 5 yards behind the team area and not hind either team/players
6. **ON THE NON TABLE SIDE AND AREAS TO THE RIGHT AND LEFT OF THE TEAMS:**
PHOTOGRAPHERS MUST BE OFF THE TURF AND MAY NOT BE CLOSER THAN THE 2ND LANE OF THE TRACK, -----by the rules of the game, players and officials have the right to move out of bounds during play.

WE UNDERSTAND YOU WANT THE BEST PICTURES POSSIBLE, HOWEVER OUR CONCERN IS FOR THE SAFETY OF THE PLAYERS AND OFFICIALS WHILE ADHEARING TO THE RULES OF THE GAME.

NYSPPHSAA TORNADO POLICY

- Tornado Watch- indicates tornados are possible. Event staff must continue to monitor the situation.
- Tornado Warning- Tornado siren sounds signaling tornado sighted or tornado indicated by radar. (absence of siren, follow weather service)

GUIDELINES/PROCEDURES

- If a tornado warning is initiated, immediate event delay shall be implemented, and all participants, spectators and athletic staff shall seek shelter immediately. Once inside a secure location, tune to local weather alert radio to be informed of the storm location, path and duration of tornado warning.
- Warning may be extended, or a new warning issued at any time, so continue to monitor.
- Safe shelter from tornado inside lowest building level, away from exterior walls/windows, with windows closed.

All Clear- tornado warning will expire after duration specified by the National Weather Service and the site director will notify all involved that the warning has ended, and the event may resume.

NFHS 2025 RULE CORRECTIONS/INTERPRETATIONS:

1. When a corner is called, a suspended player returning to the game must follow the substitution rules for corner play.
2. Substitution may only occur at the completion of the corner.

 - a. Away team wears white shirts, shinguards/socks must match.

NYSPHSAA FIELD HOCKEY DUTIES OF THE TABLE OFFICIAL

Duties of table official are as also:

1. Prior to start of the game:
 - a. Review responsibilities of the timer and scorer. The table umpire will be responsible for timing team time outs. If there is a discrepancy on the game clock (visible clock) the table umpire will determine what the proper time will be to set on the clock. Tell the lead official and scoreboard operator the correction to be made on the visible clock.
 - b. If there are ball people for the game, assist in giving instructions.
2. Oversee the teams' bench areas:
 - a. Ensure coaches and players remain behind the five-yard restraining line.
 - b. Card coaches or bench personnel if necessary.
3. Time and monitor players who receive green and/or yellow cards.
4. Ensure that substitutions are properly executed.
5. Time outs: If needed, tell the field umpire a team is requesting a time out. If unable to contact the field umpire, then the table umpire may use a whistle to call the time out when appropriate.
6. Personal Communication devices: If available, the table umpire may use a communication device to contact the on-field umpires with the following information:
 - a. Team requesting a time out.
 - b. Information needed about carding situations.
 - c. Make sure of the correct card information to be written in the scorebook.
7. Rules Interpreter: During the game, the table umpire should not act as a rules interpreter for the coaches.
8. 1 v 1 Overtime period: During the 1 v 1 procedure, the table umpire is responsible to time the 10 seconds and sound a device when the time is ended.

AS A MEMBER OF THE OFFICIATING CREW, THE TABLE OFFICIAL SHALL DRESS IN APPROPRIATE OFFICIATING ATTIRE, COLOR COORDINATING SHIRTS AND OUTER GEAR.

THE TABLE OFFICIAL SHOULD BE PREPARED TO OFFICIATE IN THE EVENT THEY ARE CALLED ON TO REPLACE A FIELD OFFICIAL.
